Dear Parents/Guardians,

I am delighted to bring you my summer Parents' Newsletter, which gives a snapshot of some of the activities, events and achievements in our school community since Easter. The newsletter also includes news about the development of the school, together with useful information in preparation for September.

As we reflect on the academic year, I am delighted that our school community has continued to go from strength to strength. A priority this year has been students' welfare, engagement in learning and enjoyment of school, which stems from the quality of teaching and support provided. Our focus on school trips, lunch and after-school clubs/events, charity work, sporting fixtures and house events has played an important part in the personal development of students. To see the smile on students' faces in being able to participate and support each other in the recent Sports Day was heart-warming.



As a community school, it is important that we seek feedback from stakeholders so that we reflect on our practices and continue to provide the best education we can. In May 24, we carried out a student survey to find out their views on the school. Over 900 Year 7-11 students completed the survey. I was delighted to see that students value the quality of teaching, feel safe in school, appreciate being encouraged to look after their mental health, report good behaviour in lessons and would recommend the school to friends.

This year, the school has introduced the behaviour reporting facility within Bromcom. This has been accompanied by a new Code of Conduct and our work to ensure greater consistency in behaviour expectations across the school. Parents/carers can now use MCAS to monitor their child's positive rewards as well as any concerns relating to conduct in lessons, homework, uniform and punctuality.

Parents can provide their feedback on the school through <u>Parent View</u>.

Raising money for charity and for people less fortunate than ourselves underpins our core values (friendship, perseverance, respect, responsibility, compassion and wisdom) and is at the centre of our Christian ethos. Through the hard work and generosity of students, we have raised over £8,000 for charities through fundraising events, including cake bake sales, non-uniform days, etc. A superb effort!

Last month, I was thrilled to see work starting on our Sixth Form build. Seeing the first spade go into the ground after 2 years of planning is another milestone in the history of our great school. The new Sixth Form block will be erected adjacent to the rear car park next to the Galileo building and is due to open to students in the Spring of 2025. This will provide a tremendous post-16 learning environment for students to enjoy for many years to come.

I must pay tribute to Year 11 and 13 students who have completed their external exams this term. Students have shown tremendous resilience and determination to prepare and sit their exams, supported by a dedicated team of staff. We wish them all the very best in their future.

As the academic year draws to a close, sadly, we are saying farewell to some staff (details at the end of this newsletter) as they leave us to embark upon pastures new. We owe them a huge gratitude for their commitment to William Farr Church of England Comprehensive School and wish them all the best for the future.

On a personal note, this is my final parents' newsletter to you as Headteacher as I take early retirement at the end of this academic year. This has been an emotional term for me as I say goodbye to William Farr after 13 years and 5 years as Headteacher. The last 5 years has seen us successfully navigate Covid, address the on-going challenges to the school budget and meet the requirements from our first Ofsted inspection in 13 years. Throughout this time, we have continued to be one of the highest performing non-selective schools in the country, which I am incredibly proud of. This could not have been achieved without the unswerving commitment of staff, dedication of the Senior Leadership Team and support from the Governing Body, who have all worked tirelessly so that students can 'engage in life in all its fullness' (John 10:10). I owe them my sincere gratitude.

Finally, I would like to thank you for all for time you have spent supporting your child and the school during my time as Headteacher. I have been touched by the kind words and good wishes you have sent to me over the last few months.

William Farr is a unique and special school. The sense of community and Christian ethos runs deep within the spirit of the school and will continue to underpin its future success. I feel very privileged to have been one of only six Headteachers to have led this remarkable school in 72 years. I wish Mr Edgar, the Interim Headteacher, all the best for next year as he takes over the reins in September 24.

Having put school first throughout my 33 years in teaching, I am looking forward to putting my family and my welfare first and watching my beloved Scunthorpe United, who need all the support they can get!

NEWS FROM THE GOVERNORS

The vision of our school is "to provide all members of the school community with the opportunities to engage with 'life in all its fullness' (John 10:10) through the highest quality of education, encouragement and endeavour. We are committed to striving for excellence and ensuring that all students are known, valued and can achieve."

During the past few months, as Governors, we have witnessed as we visited, walked around school, met with staff and students, discussed, and were informed about what was happening in school, what "life in all its fullness" really means at William Farr.

Our Y11 and Y13 students have taken their GCSE and A Level exams that are, of course, a vital and most important part of their time at our school. However, that is only part of our students' life at William Farr. There has been the traditional end-of-term last day celebrations for both Y13 and Y11 when the students and our staff celebrate both 5 and 7 years at our school, the lifelong friends and memories that have been made here. The Y11 and Y13 proms are also a great expression and tribute of our students' time at our school and following the end of their exams, they really enjoy themselves. Y11 even had a TV in the room to watch England. These end-of-year celebrations are also enjoyed by our Y9 students at the end of Key Stage 3. Y7 celebrated their first year in school with an inflatable extravaganza via a variety of blow-up fun equipment in the sports hall and on the tennis courts!

However, "life in all its fullness" at William Farr also includes, for example, visits to Welton St Mary's Church to be thankful for our school, staff, friends, etc. as part of our Christian ethos. Students (& dedicated staff) taking students on their Gold, Silver & Bronze Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme (in all weathers), both practice and actual expeditions, end-of-year trips/celebrations, excursions out as part of ongoing coursework or trips as part of the life at our school. End-of-term concerts where our talented musicians, singers, players, actors/actresses, etc. show and demonstrate their skills and enthusiasm, to the delight of both parents and staff.

None of this would be possible without the ongoing support of our dedicated staff who arrange, guide, support and encourage our students to grasp the opportunities open to them at our school.

We, as the school Governors, have the great pleasure of seeing the issues we discuss at our meetings come to fruition in school by the events as outlined above. Also, when we visit the school and meet our students, together with the great examination results and increased life chances our students have when they leave us. We see the change from our Y7 new, sometimes quite nervous children, through to Y11 /Y13 when they leave us as confident, young adults.

Governors have 3 main functions and responsibilities at Willam Farr these are to:-

- 1. Agreeing the Clarity of Vision, Ethos and Strategic Direction of the School
- 2. Monitoring School Performance
- 3. Financial Management

However, this year we had one of our most important tasks to undertake and one that is not on that list, that is to appoint a new Headteacher. Our school would not be the continued success it is for both our students and staff without the professional dedication of Mr Knowler our Headteacher. We would like to thank Mr Knowler for his exceptional leadership he has given the school since he took over as our Headteacher temporarily in September 2019, and then as our substantive Headteacher from February 2020. In this time Mr Knowler has successfully guided us through Covid, Ofsted, our 70th Birthday celebrations, the school gaining our best Progress 8 examination results ever in 2023. As well as the new 6th Form Building that is starting to rise out of the ground as I write this. We of course wish Mr Knowler a very long and happy early retirement – our task now is to find a suitable successor. We welcome Mr Edgar as our Temporary Headteacher from 1st September who will be with us for a year which will give the GB time to recruit a permanent Head.

There will be parent Governor elections in the Autum term so if any current or incoming parents feel they may like to join us, please contact our Clerk Mrs Sarah Elderkin and we would be pleased meet you and talk over what being a Governor at William Farr means. For me, it means I can play a little part in helping the children of our local area unlock their potential, achieve their ambitions/dreams and give them through the school values a moral compass to be successful citizens of the world they will help create.

Finaly, I hope that you all have a good summer break and we look forward to seeing you all again safe and well in September. For the parents and students who will not be returning to William Farr in September we hope that you will look back at your time at our school with fond memories, have made some lifelong friends and be looking forward to the next chapter of your life with confidence.


In September 2024, the school welcomes to the Senior Leadership Team:

Farewell to Mr Knowler

At the end of this term, we are sadly saying farewell to Mr Knowler, our Headteacher, who has been at the helm for the last 5 years and has spent 13 years at William Farr.

As Heads of the Student Council, we sat down with Mr Knowler to talk to him about his memories of the school and future plans.

Why did you want to be a Headteacher?

I didn't want to be a Headteacher, but I did want to be The Headteacher of William Farr Church of England Comprehensive School! Teachers come into education to make a difference to the life chances of young people. At William Farr, I have been able to make that happen at a whole school level – a great privilege.

What is your proudest moment as Headteacher?

I will never forget standing up in Lincoln Cathedral in October 2022 to address 2,000 people, including former and current staff, students and Governors to celebrate out 70th anniversary. The hairs stood up on the back of my neck at such an iconic venue, our mother Church. I often watch the video montage of the service on the school website, and it still fills me with immense pride today. This will stay with me forever!

What is your greatest achievement as Headteacher?

It's not about my achievements but the achievements of students. To see so many students over the years leave William Farr with the skills, confidence and qualifications to progress to their next steps in life, fills you will great satisfaction knowing that you have helped to make a difference!

Why is William Farr such a successful school?

The simple answer is that we live out our school vision daily and our core values underpin everything we do in school. Our Christian distinctiveness makes us very special.

What have been your greatest challenges as Headteacher?

The Covid years were especially challenging when we had to provide online learning at home, whilst supporting the vulnerable children and those whose parents were key workers in school. I remember having 2 Teams meetings with the Senior Leadership Team during the Christmas holidays (I was popular!) to plan for Covid testing when we reopened in January, whilst having to keep you all socially distanced. I never thought I would become an NHS Manager!

Due to the lack of government funding, schools are under immense pressure to 'balance the budget' and this isn't going away. I hope the incoming Government recognise that schools will go out of business unless they step in and support them with additional money.

Why do you always dress up in whole school assembly?

I often ask myself that very question! I always wanted our whole school assembly to be a fun experience and for students to look forward to it. After I did one, students kept asking me 'What are you wearing this term?' and it turned into a competition for form groups to guess my attire. I love to see you all enjoying yourself and celebrating our special community. As Headteacher, I don't get to spend as much time as I would like with students and this helps me to connect with you and shows the Headteacher has a human side, too!

Do you have any regrets as Headteacher?

A good question. Now isn't the time to spill the beans! I do remember being on car park duty one day in my hi-vis jacket and a parent wanted to complain about the traffic. They asked me how they could get in touch with the Headteacher – I said I would pass on the message! I also regretted going to Center Parcs one summer on holiday as when I returned in September a parent said they recognised me in the swimming pool! My other regret is that I didn't start my teaching career earlier at William Farr. 33 years ago, I applied to William Farr to be a Newly Qualified Teacher, having just left university, but wasn't even shortlisted for the job and yet ended up a Headteacher!

What will be your legacy?

That will be for others to judge! Students having great memories of their school days and remembering the tremendous work that staff did to help them on their way.

I remember introducing the new school uniform, which is never a popular step, but I think it is really smart and I hope it will continue for years to come.

For me personally, the opening of the Sixth Form block in the Spring of 2025. We worked really hard to secure the funds and persuade the Local Authority that we needed to expand our facilities and provision. This will be a fantastic legacy, which will benefit many Sixth Form students for years to come. I hope I may be invited back when it's finished to open it?

What are your plans after leaving William Farr?

Having been teaching for 33 years, I am looking forward to spending more time with my young family and playing golf. I have just purchased my season ticket for my beloved Scunthorpe United and hope that with my support we can get out of the National League North!. I have had some offers of education consultancy work, which I am also interested in on a part-time basis.

It was great to talk to Mr Knowler about his time at William Farr and we could see just how much the school has meant to him. He has always been such an approachable Headteacher and always has time for students. We know that much of what a Headteacher does goes on behind the scenes unnoticed. On behalf of the school, we want to thank Mr Knowler for his dedication and commitment in leading William Farr. We will miss him and wish him every success in the future.

Until then, we wish everyone a lovely summer.






CODE OF CONDUCT

The new and simplified Code of Conduct introduced this year outlines the conduct conducive to a positive learning environment.

It is important that everyone knows what is expected of them and can play their part. All students have a right to learn, to achieve and to be safe in school. All students have a responsibility to positively and actively contribute to a school climate aligned with the School's Core Values.

Our Values must be visible through students' attitudes and conduct at all times, including at lunchtime, breaktime and moving between lessons.



Thank you for your support this year in reinforcing the Code of Conduct at home and using information communicated to you via MCAS to hold discussions with your child. Should you have any issues accessing MCAS, then please do not hesitate to contact the school via <u>wfsbromcom@williamfarr.lincs.sch.uk</u>. We will continue to work together with parents on how best to support you with the technical aspects.

The number of Positive events awarded across the school since September stands at over 90,000. This means that on average, per week, over 2,000 positive events are awarded to students. This is a fantastic achievement! Well done to our students who continue to consistently demonstrate and 'live out' the school's Vision and School Values – Compassion, Friendship, Perseverance, Respect, Responsibility and Wisdom.

Mobile Phones

A reminder that under no circumstances are students allowed to have a mobile phone in their possession during the school day. If students are found in possession of a mobile phone, the School Behaviour Policy will apply. The rationale behind this decision is twofold. Firstly, we know from other schools which allow such devices the level of disruption that can be caused. Secondly, the school has an open policy in terms of students using the school telephone to communicate with parents where necessary. Any device which has mobile internet capability must not be brought into school. This includes Smart Watches.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

Our full range of approved school uniform is available to purchase in the Uniform Direct store, Dixon Way, Lincoln, LN6 7XN.

Online shopping from Uniform Direct is also available, with delivery direct to your chosen address. Ordering online is very simple, just visit <u>www.uniform-direct.com</u> and then navigate to 'Select Your School' and 'Senior Schools' and scroll down to 'William Farr School' to find all items of approved William Farr school uniform.

Black leather trainers and black 'Air Force 1s' are not permitted in school. We are aware that retailers market these as 'shoes' when they are trainers. Please be aware of this when you are purchasing shoes ready for September 2024 that there should be no logos and no adornments of any kind. SITE DEVELOPMENTS

Work is underway to create our new Sixth Form block.

Staff and governors at William Farr met the construction team to mark the start of building work. The new build will provide study facilities, a recreational area, kitchen, office space and toilets for post-16 students.

Headteacher Mr Knowler said, "It is much needed and will create a fabulous learning environment for our sixth formers. Our long-term strategic direction has been to further develop the Sixth Form and broaden our range of courses to increase student numbers. I'm delighted to see spades in the ground with a completion date of Spring next year."

Lincolnshire contractor Lindum Group has been appointed to complete the single-storey building. The site is located to the west of the existing school within a triangular parcel of land between a footpath, staff car park and existing school buildings.

The dining room in the main building will also be remodelled and extended over the summer holidays by Lindum. The work on the dining room, like the Sixth Form block, is welcome, creating additional capacity and improving the environment for staff and students.

Both projects will be paid from Section 106 monies from Lincolnshire County Council. The school has developed a strong working partnership with the Council, and it would like to thank the Council for its support which has enabled these two projects to go ahead.

The school has been working with Lindum for almost two years to help bring the Sixth Form block forward. The contractor's team produced a feasibility report in line with the budget and appointed Kier Design to draw up plans. Lindum then took the scheme through planning and pre-construction stages.

Lindum Co-Chair Edward Chambers said: "Lindum has vast experience working in the education sector. It was great to be on site to mark the start of this project and I look forward to seeing it progress over the coming months. We employ many past students from William Farr, and the school site is close to Lindum Homes' Hawks Chase development, where we're building new market sale houses. As a local contractor, we are really pleased to be playing a role in providing the infrastructure needed to support this growing village."

YEAR 12 MOCK INTERVIEWS

Over the past year, we have been running a school-wide careers education programme, which has included activities both in and out of school.

We aim to embed the linking of careers to subject lessons and students in Years 8, 9 & 10 have also received dedicated careers PSHE lessons. The focus for Year 12 has been on employability skills and this is something we hope to develop for next year.



Assemblies have included talks from local education providers (e.g. Lincoln and Riseholme Colleges), as well as a range of employers, both national and local, including National Grid, Lincolnshire Co-op, the Civil Service and the NHS.

As well as big events, like our Post-16 Morning, Careers Fair and Post-18 Information Evening, we have hosted smaller events in school, many run by subject departments, plus all school trips now include a careers education element wherever this is practical. We have introduced several new trips, including a whole year trip to Lincoln University for Year 10, which aimed to raise awareness of university as an option for all students, especially those who had not previously considered it.

We are very lucky, as a school, to have excellent connections with local employers, many of whom are school alumni or parents of current students. This allows us to run events like our Year 12 mock interview morning (new for this year!) and we are extremely grateful for this support.

PHENOMENAL FUNDRAISING

William Betts (Year 8) and Thomas Betts (Year 11), along with their family and friends, have raised over £27,000 for the Paediatric Intensive Care and High Dependency Unit at King's.

Thomas and William's sister, Elena, was born with a rare genetic condition called MMIHS, which meant that her digestive system didn't develop properly. This resulted in end stage liver failure and Elena was listed for a multi-organ transplant. In August 2017, after six months of waiting, aged just 17 months, Elena received 5 organs: stomach, liver, pancreas, small intestine and colon. Due to complications, Elena went on the transplant waiting list again and in August 2019 received all 5 organs again. Sadly, due to complications post transplant, battling rejection and infection, Elena passed away peacefully on 30 December 2019.

Because of organ donation, the family were able to have Elena at home for two whole years. Taking inspiration from her positive outlook on life, they launched a campaign called 'The Elena Effect' as a legacy in her memory.



This was a joint venture to highlight the importance of organ donation (especially the lesser known organs, such as the bowel and stomach), giving blood and also to raise money for King's College Hospital Children's Critical Care Centre in London, where Elena received her transplants. The money raised has been used to fully renovate the Parents' Room on the ward and the room has been dedicated in Elena's memory. Other families will now be able to have a space where they can try to relax - even just for short periods of time. It is a little oasis of calm, somewhere to retreat to, a place to eat, have a hot drink, a chat and a chance to restore the batteries, ready to take on the next long stint.

CREATIVE WRITING

Have you considered what life will be like in 300 years' time? What truly makes a horrific transformation? How can fairy tales be adapted to the big screen?

These are the questions that the English department has posed to Key Stage 3 students this June for its annual Creative Writing Week focusing on 'Metamorphosis'.

In Year 7, students have looked at literary depictions of the future, including H.G. Wells' "The Time Machine", as well as Ernest Cline's "Ready Player One". Each of these visions of the future have been used as stimulus for students' own creative writing. In addition to this, Year 7 also had the privilege of a visit from Daniel Blythe; a young adult writer famed for his novelisations of the hit BBC series "Doctor Who".

Exploration of the horror genre has been the key focus for students in Year 8. Throughout the week, we have read about Dr. Jekyll's descent into the depraved Mr. Hyde; witnessed the terrifying presence of Dracula and confronted the aliens of War of the Worlds. This study of the grotesque has ultimately inspired students' own descriptions of horrific transformations.

Finally, Year 9 have been reimagining classic fairy tales, such as "Little Red Riding Hood" as modern feature films, as well as using the film script form. Alongside this, Lydia Sanders (author of the "Herstories" series) has delivered workshops, focusing on the retelling of historical female narratives in both poetic and prose forms.

It has been a real pleasure to see students' love of reading and creativity flourish throughout Creative Writing Week. The English department wishes to thank students for their wonderful contributions, as well as the Friends of William Farr School for their support. We can't wait for next year's!

Well done to everyone who donated a piece of artwork.


































ART EXHIBITION

THE IMPORTANCE OF EXTRA-CURRICULAR

Extra-curricular activities are any activity that students participate in outside of the normal classroom environment.

There have been so many wonderful activities on offer this year, some during the lunch hour and some after school. There are those activities which involve many hours spent outside of the classroom in order to participate in them, like Duke of Edinburgh, orchestra and any of the sports teams. Those which can be just 'turned up' for, such as chess, bridge, craft club and choir. However, whatever the activity, the best results and most enjoyment are always gained through dedication and commitment over a period of time.

As the year draws to an end, we would like to focus on why extra-curricular activities are important for all children. They are designed to enhance a child's learning experience, sometimes by reinforcing lessons learnt in the classroom and sometimes by widening that experience through the teaching of a new skill. Research shows that children benefit greatly from having a variety of different ways to learn and should be part of a well-rounded and balanced education. Most studies done on the contribution of extra-curricular activities have been done in the USA.

These studies show that the benefits for children are wide-ranging, from educationally (improvements in achievement and educational outcomes), to psychologically (improvements in measures relating to self-esteem and motivation) continuing through to civic engagement and risk behaviours (improvements in community spirit and a sense of 'connectedness' to the school) (Fredricks & Eccles 2006). Dumais 2006 also noted that extra-curricular activities play a prominent role in narrowing the inequality gap between advantaged and disadvantaged young people. As well as providing students with new skills and abilities, extra-curricular activities are vital in boosting pupils' confidence to interact socially with others and extend their social networks.



We would like to take this opportunity to thank all those staff involved in our extensive extra-curricular programme, all of whom give up their own time to ensure our students have a wide offer available. We would also like to encourage more pupils to take advantage of the school's extra-curricular programme in September, if not for any of the many advantages listed above, then simply to have fun and relax away from the pressures of school work!
